

#### **Are You Interested in the Future of First Presbyterian?**

Due to my military and church background, I have lived in many places. Being a person of faith, that means I have been to many churches. You might think, "Well, that's normal for a pastor." But since my ordination in 1998, I have had at least five years where I was just doing military work and didn't even have a chapel congregation. During that time, my family and I visited churches.

The number one thing that determined whether we would return wasn't the sermon. It wasn't the music. It wasn't the order of service or if what we heard lined up with our theology. The number one item is whether the people worshiping welcomed us or not. Did it matter to anyone that we were there? Even if they welcomed Lesley and me, what about our kids? Did they feel welcomed? Do they like that we are there? Did anyone welcome them?

Few activities are more important to gathering around worship than welcoming people, especially if they are newcomers. We don't know their situation or why they have come. Perhaps they are new to the area, seeking a church, or maybe it has been a hard week and they are seeking comfort and connection. The way we make people feel might very much change their day. I was very glad recently to see an embarrassed parent being affirmed by our worshipers that it is okay that their child was dancing in the sanctuary. The child's dancing brought joy, not judgment. I also know the only reason they come up for communion is that they were encouraged to by their fellow worshipers to Christ's Table, open to all.

This welcoming extends to our fellowship time as well. I encourage you to learn about visitors who come to fellowship. Get to know them and invite them back. I was pleased to see this last Sunday, when we had visitors. A table of our members sat with them. It should always be like that.

Hebrews 10:24-25 NRSV And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

The very future of our church rests on this being a place where people come and encounter God and find people who are interested in God's children. Jesus taught that loving God and neighbor are intertwined. Sadly, not all churches practice this. Many come to church to interact with their friends. That's fine, but it can't be limited to that.

I hope we at First Presbyterian Church are always known, before all else, as a welcoming congregation.


Thank you to all the folks who participated, and all those who donated items for the various ministries. We were truly the hands and feet of Jesus.




#### Personnel, Stewardship and Finance
