Youth Mission Report By Katie Eatherly

We stall while we wait for the grand gesture – to speak to thousands, to touch the masses, to travel to a foreign land. But can we walk across the street and talk to our neighbor?



Can we shelter our unsheltered? Serve the underserved? Acknowledge the stigmatized? Can we feed our hungry neighbors? Jesus' example for us was often the opposite of the grand gesture. He held a child. He ate fish with his friends around a campfire. He touched a leper when no one else would. He discussed the Scriptures in the temple. And every one of those simple gestures had a profound impact.

How can we be more intentional in the mission to which God has called us?

While we were immersed in the community surrounding The Campbell Farm— our youth kids explored this exact question. We had the privilege of supporting the Yakima Tribe at each level, from food distribution in partnership with NW Harvest, food bank support at the Toppenish Food Bank, to handing individuals meals in the street with Campbell Farms feeding program.

The feeding program at Campbell Farm is not just an act of generosity—it is, quite literally, a lifeline for many families in the Yakima Nation. Operating Monday through Thursday, the program ensures that every child and elder in a household receives at least one meal a day. For many of these individuals, it's the only food they will see that day.

The stories Carly and Mattie brought back weren't just eye-opening—they were heartbreaking and urgent. They shared stories of children—some naked or barely clothed—playing in the streets without supervision. In too many homes, there were no adults present, and no food in the house, just children caring for younger siblings and waiting for the one meal they knew would come from the farm's van. It was a sobering reminder of the vulnerability these children live with every single day.

This kind of generational vulnerability has only deepened in the wake of COVID-19, which devastated many Native communities. On the Yakima Reservation, where extended families often live together in multigenerational homes, the pandemic not only caused widespread illness but tore apart the family support systems that once helped care for children. Grandparents—who often functioned as the primary caregivers—were lost at alarming rates, leaving children without the guidance, protection, or structure they so desperately need. In many cases, it's now older siblings, sometimes just barely school-aged themselves, who are trying to fill the void. Hearing these stories gave our team a renewed sense of urgency and purpose. It reframed our service—from bagging rice or pulling weeds—to something much bigger: standing in solidarity with a community in crisis. It affirmed that our presence wasn't just helpful; it was essential. We weren't just volunteering—we were answering a call to compassion, to justice, and to human dignity.


Home Communion Servers Needed

FPC Free Food Pantry

At the corner of hope and hospitality, a small wooden box with a simple sign now stands near the entrance of First Presbyterian Church—a Free Food Pantry. Modest in size but overflowing with purpose, this pantry is a new chapter in our congregation's story of love in action.

Take what you need. Leave what you can.

The pantry is for anyone—neighbors experiencing food insecurity, families in between paychecks, or someone who simply forgot an item at the store. And in this small, sturdy box is an invitation for all of us to practice radical generosity.

But keeping the pantry stocked is not the work of one person or one committee. It is a shared effort—one that we as a church family and broader community can embrace together. You can help by:



- •Adding a few extra items to your grocery cart—non-perishables like peanut butter, rice, pasta, granola bars, canned soups, or toiletries.
- •Bringing donations on Sundays or during the week and placing them directly in the pantry or in the designated bin inside the church.
 - •Spreading the word to friends, neighbors, and local groups who might want to support the effort.
- Praying for the pantry and those who use it, that it may be a source not just of food, but of comfort and hope.

As Proverbs 22:9 reminds us, "The generous will themselves be blessed, for they share their food with the poor." In a world where many go unseen and unheard, this pantry reminds us that compassion is best shown in daily, tangible acts.
